I would like to acknowledge the relevance of COEMO's aim of empowering ethnic minority organisations, to engage more widely and effectively in mainstream activities in Bradford, because that is precisely where the emphasis is, in the development of cohesive communities. Members of cohesive communities have a common vision and sense of belonging, they appreciate their diversity and together they build strong, positive relationships.

Furthermore, it is my fervent hope that through this AGM, COEMO will forge much closer links with organisations such as the Bradford Youth Development Partnership, to deliberate and develop on matters affecting Bradford as a whole.

I wish you a very successful AGM and development of a progressive relationship with all your partners.

The achievements during the year have been many. May this trend continue.



Background:

In Bradford it is estimated that there are over 300 Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) voluntary sector organisations and community groups, which amounts to approximately 10.9% of the estimated total number of VCS groups and organisations within the district. The BME sector includes South Asian Communities, African and African Caribbean Communities, Central and Eastern European communities and Refugee / Asylum seeker communities.

Our services are open to all BME organisations and groups. Currently our membership stands at 64 BME groups and organisations.

COEMO member organisations do not receive any preferential treatment other than their direct involvement in managing the day to day affairs of COEMO, which is a company limited by guarantee for charitable purposes.

The past twelve months has been an extremely busy one for COEMO, and in striving to achieve our objectives, we have concentrated our activities in three areas:

1. Advocacy and representational role for the BME sector.

- 2. Support to front line BME organisations in building a stronger infrastructure of BME groups.
- 3. Building the capacity of COEMO itself.

Examples of our Advocacy/Representational Role

In our role as advocates for the BME voluntary sector and as an organisation representing a substantial number of BME groups, we have regularly participated as a member of the following key decision making bodies in Bradford and District.

- ★ Bradford Vision Board
- ★ Bradford Community Network (CNet)
- ★ Infrastructure Support Organisations ISO Group)
- ★ Building Communities Partnership (BCP)
- ★ Closer working relationship with the Association of Council of Voluntary Services (ACVS)
- ★ Airedale Master plan as a team member of ARUP(agent to prepare and implement the plan)
- ★ The Yorkshire and Humber Regional Forum with the development of the Regional BME panel
- ★ Learning and Skills Council (LSC) District's Learning Partnership
- ★ Bradford University's community engagement programme

In addition to the above commitments we were asked, from time to time, to advise / participate on specific issues with West Yorkshire Police, Primary Care Trusts, the Probation Service, Big Lottery Fund, Yorkshire Forward and some Government departments.





Examples of our practical support to frontline organisations

We have provided direct intensive practical support to BME organisations in the following areas:

- ★ Advised and assisted in writing funding applications.
- ★ Provided references for groups to support applications, etc.
- ★ Negotiating with funders on individual applications.
- ★ Helped to develop and produce constitutions.
- ★ Helped to develop, produce and review policies to meet PQASSO requirements.
- ★ Assessed training needs for management committee members and staff.
- ★ Organised training programmes for management committees.
- ★ Facilitated recruitment of staff (including the preparation of job description, person specifications, advertising, sitting on the interview panel, and preparing terms and conditions of employment).
- Mentored volunteers.

- ★ Developed activities and action plans.
- ★ Organised AGMs.
- ★ Secured short term accommodation.
- * Acted as a mediator.
- ★ We have also given one-off advice and signposted services to many organisations.
- ★ Our electronic information system proved to be a very useful service to all BME organisations with internet facilities.

Key information provided included:

- funding opportunities,
- training opportunities,
- employment opportunities,
- networking opportunities,
- vacancies on decision making bodies and services provided by generic Infrastructure Support Organisations.
- ★ HR Support: We have teamed up with the Pay and Employment Rights Service to work with 20 BME VCS front line groups/organisations to carry out 'health checks' on their policies and procedures and provide tailored advice and support to develop their HR systems. Each group/organisation will receive approximately 5 hours of consultancy support from PERS Senior Employment Rights Advisors. This work will be completed by end of March 2007.





Examples of our Research and Publications

- ★ We have produced and published report on the district's BME learning needs for the Learning and Skills Council (which has contributed to the LSC's strategy and resources for the BME sector).
- ★ We have conducted research into the infrastructure needs of BME groups for the Government's Change Up programme and published findings and recommendations.
- ★ In partnership with the Yorkshire and Humber Regional Forum, we conducted a pilot study on "communications strategy for the BME sector". This report has now been published by the Yorkshire and Humber Regional Forum.

Examples of our Consultations, Seminars and Networking Events

- ★ We have organised and conducted; a Working Together conference, Change Up project conferences, a Local Area Agreement seminar, a Neighbourhood Learning In Deprived Communities (NLDC) funding workshop, Performance Improvement seminars and Community Consultations in Keighley on the Airedale Master Plan.
- We have organised events for National and International organisations to shape up their BME engagement and participation plans. These include: Sunderland BME Network, Blackburn BME Network, Malmo City Council and the University of Malmo (Sweden).
- ★ We have worked through the changes with agencies and Bradford Council during the closure of the Community Development Service.

Examples of our Projects Work

★ Change Up Project: We are the lead body in Bradford to implement the Change Up Infrastructure Investment Programme's continuation funding from Capacity Builders (UK) Ltd fund for 2006/2007 in relation to BME priorities. Amongst other activities we are committed to support 15 BME organisations, including in depth support for 6 of them. We have now selected these 6 organisations. Work with one has been completed, 2 others are about to be completed and work with the other 3 will start shortly.



- * Working Together Project: The Learning +
 Skills Council for West Yorkshire has
 allocated grant for the period 1st August 2006
 to 31st July 2007 for investment for NLDC in
 the Bradford District. The Working Together in
 Bradford Project is being developed by
 Russell Street Project in partnership with
 COEMO. Amongst other activities we are to
 establish a BME Network to engage with the
 diverse range of BME-led organisations in the
 district and identify their particular
 specialisms and in particular help them
 develop towards learning providers' status.
- ★ Performance Hub Race Equality Project: The National Performance Hub (PH) - works with voluntary, community and social enterprise organisations and it was looking for a number of voluntary and community organisations that were prepared to develop approaches to performance improvement in their own organisation. They invited up to six organisations from 9 regions of England and Wales to participate in three different performance-related projects. COEMO, jointly with ABCD and BCVS, applied to carry out the task in relation to the Performance Hub Race Equality project Theme 3 "Collaboration to Support Performance". To our surprise (being a national competition) we have been chosen to deliver this project.



We are committed to deliver:

- ★ The strategies used by infrastructure organisations to both approach and encourage performance improvement work within BME front line voluntary sector organisations.
- ★ Ways that BME and generic infrastructure organisations can improve their working relationship and share ideas to support each other and BME frontline organisations.

Various activities have been undertaken to achieve the above objectives. This project is to be completed in February 2007 and a final report will be produced which we understand will be used as a case study nationally.

★ Capacity Builders (UK) Ltd Project:

We have just been commissioned by the

Capacity Builders (UK) Ltd under the Pilot

Grants Programme - Improving Reach 2006-08

(January 2007 to March 2008). Again this was a national competition.

This project will help a total of 60 BME organisations in Bradford and District with advice, guidance and practical support in a number of identified areas, as follows:

★ Support in fundraising and financial management, Improvement of knowledge and

- skills in organisational and project management. Greater influence on local policy-making.
- ★ Support of management committee members, networking and sharing of best practice.
- ★ Advocacy and representation at decisionmaking bodies.

Out of the total of 60 organisations, 10 will be offered intensive support over the 15 months.

The project will also help build the capacity of COEMO as an infrastructure organisation offering support to other BME organisations and representing this sector. Once the sustainability of COEMO has been assured, it will continue to help BME organisations well after this proposed project has come and gone.

The effect of the work described above cannot be underestimated. Not only is COEMO a leading player on behalf of the BME voluntary sector, but the impact it is having on strategies (locally, regionally and nationally), helping to bring resources to the district and BME communities and developing the capacity of frontline groups and organisations, means that the BME sector has a firm base from which to build a sustainable future.



Future Plans and Director's Summary



It has been another busy and challenging year for COEMO, with further changes in policies and strategies at all levels, more projects and closer ties with partner organisations and networks.

It has also been a successful year. The two main reasons for this has been COEMO's continuing and developing involvement in key partnerships and further development of its support for frontline organisations. We are looking forward to providing more support in the coming year, and to building up our membership, particularly from amongst the Central and Eastern European Communities.

A few brief comments on the main areas of work:

- 1. Advocacy and representation we are working closely with many key partners and we are particularly pleased that the ISO group is working as a real partnership putting together joint applications for funding, for example. This co-operation will serve to strengthen the links between the BME sector and the generic infrastructure organisations in providing better services for frontline groups.
- 2. Capacity Building our ability to provide more direct support to more groups, which was regarded as an essential are of work to prioritise by the recent members meeting, is now much improved through "Improving Reach" and other Capacity Builders funding, and COEMO is looking forward to getting this work underway.

- 3. BME Directory the need for local groups and partners to know about what services and activities are available was a key finding in the research we have undertaken over the last year, and a user-friendly Directory of BME groups and organisation will be an essential improvement in our information services, in addition
- 4. An improved website will have information on funding opportunities, infrastructure support, decision making in the district, training opportunities on governance, learning opportunities, supports on constitution and policies etc

From the above comments, it can be seen that COEMO's main tasks in the coming year will be to improve communications and to enhance our services to local groups.

The messages COEMO wishes to convey to our partners in the coming year are as follows:

- 1. Learning and Skills Council and Bradford District Learning Partnership the BME sector has many areas of expertise and specialist knowledge, but BME organisations need support and funding to become providers of quality training.
- 2. Infrastructure Support Organisations need to continue to adapt and expand their services to the BME sector, and take account of the specific needs of BME groups when planning their activities.
- **3. Funders -** COEMO ask funders to have proactive contact with BME groups, especially to assist them in looking at sustainable funding.
- 4. Policy Makers should take notice of the gaps in services related to BME communities and enable such communities to have a platform to express their concerns (COEMO has suggested that a revamped Council for Racial Equality may be the way to do this).
- **5. Larger BME organisations should support smaller ones** to help them with planning, through mentoring schemes and so on.


















CNet COMMUNITY NETWORK BRADFORD & DISTRICT

- ★ Provision and maintenance of a range of two-way communication channels to ensure members and VCS groups are kept up-to date with information, activities and opportunities to get involved.

- ★ We develop, support and run active citizenship and leadership programmes about influencing district policies, plans and service delivery.


